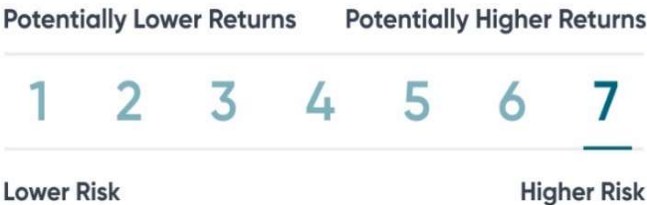
Description of this fund

The Kernel S&P Global Clean Energy Fund invests in globally listed companies involved in clean energy related businesses, including energy production and energy equipment. It is designed to track the S&P Developed ex-Korea Clean Energy Index (NZD).

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the Kernel S&P Global Clean Energy Fund :



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund’s assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

Note that even the lowest category does not mean a risk-free investment, and there are other risks that are not captured by this rating.

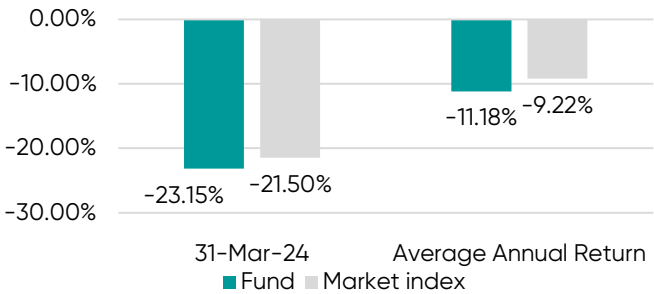

How has the fund performed?

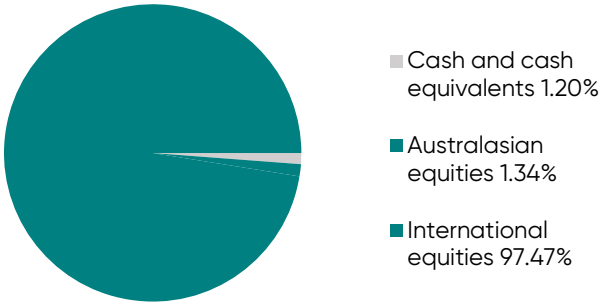
Investors are not charged individual action fees for specific actions or decisions (for example, for withdrawing from funds). All fees are inclusive of GST.

Example of how this applies to an investor

Emma had \$10,000 in the fund on 1 January 2024 and did not make any further contributions. On 31 December 2024, Emma incurred a loss after fund charges were deducted of \$1,742 (that is -17.42% of her initial \$10,000). This gives Emma a total loss after tax of \$1,837 for the period.
